Fern Cole – grew up in Ortonville, a small town in western Minnesota, the youngest of four children. She attended St. Olaf College and while playing in the college band met Wally Cole. They married while Wally was attending Luther Seminary in St. Paul and had two sons, David and Steven. When the boys were 5 and 7 Wally received a call to begin a congregation at Rock Point, AZ, in the middle of the Navajo reservation. Fern studied the Navajo language and was able to help with the translation of the Bible into Navajo. Fern says, "There were many chances to see the world through different eyes, like the time an old man speaking in Navajo called me 'my grandmother' and meant it as a compliment. It took a few minutes for me to accept it as a term of respect." Both their sons eventually returned to work at Rock Point after college, and eventually presented Fern and Wally with six grandchildren. The Coles retired in 1990 and moved to Prescott, experiencing some culture shock when they got here – everyone spoke English! Both Fern and Wally volunteer at YRMC, he as a Chaplain and she as Chair of our Ambassador volunteers. She says, "We are grateful to be able to give back to the hospital that has cared for us both." Fern joined us in 2001 and has contributed 1700 hours since then - thank you, Fern!

Susan Anderson - is also a two time MVV winner, having won the first time in 2009. She has worked at the Information Desk since 2003, and in 2009 began also working in the gift shop. Recently she also cross trained to work in the Cardiac Cath lab and surgery waiting rooms as a substitute.
